Notes from the President's Corner

The Covid vaccines are the big news item both nationally and provincially. Vaccine quantities are ramping up. This week, I heard on the news 99% of us older Nova Scotians have received our first shots. That is fabulous news! Some people, for whatever reason, are against getting vaccinated. The Moderna and Pfizer vaccines have proven to be 95% – 96% effective, without any serious side effects. Approximately 50% of all Americans have received their first dose. On top of that, 132 million have received their second dose. There are approximately 326 million people in the US, so that makes 163 million first doses plus 132 million second doses for a total of 295 million doses. Also, hundreds of millions of people around the world have happily rolled up their sleeves. That's a lot of doses and a lot of good news data.

We are all very tired of the lockdowns and the only way out of this mess is to get a large percentage of the world's population vaccinated. My message is clear, and it is the same as the World Health Organization, get your vaccine as soon as it becomes available to you! You can book your appointment online and if you need help, Angie and/or Gennie are happy to book appointments for you and your family. Don't hesitate to ask for help. Also, if transportation is an issue, Gennie can hook you up with the East Hants Community Rider. Chris and I have received our first shot of Moderna. We are getting really close to putting shovels in the ground with our major construction projects. As you know, the boiler room requires a small addition to the existing building to accommodate the bigger boiler which is due to arrive this summer. The steam tunnel that runs underground from the boiler room to the planer mill needs to be moved as it is in the way of the addition.

That's the bad news, however, the good news is the steam pipes are 25 years old and will be replaced with new pipes. Also, our communications lines are in this tunnel, and we will be upgrading the piping that contains these lines and hopefully we won't have any communication issues for security, fire protection and high-speed internet connections for on-line technical assistance from our equipment suppliers.

Lindsay Construction will have a survey crew here next week to survey out the sawmill building, the boiler room, and the steam tunnel. The first part of the sawmill project needs to be a new log deck and infeed system, as the building will be going through the existing log deck. Before starting this project, we dig some major test holes to determine what is hidden underground. The survey crew will be sporting safety vests but, as always, when we have guests travelling throughout the property, please be aware of their presence and keep everyone safe.

Life Safety have completed the sprinkler system in the planer mill and are closing in on the completion of the system in the bin sorter building at the sawmill. Both projects have presented their own unique challenges due to the equipment in the buildings and the heights of the ceilings. Once the bin sorter system is complete, both systems will be initialized and become fully operational. I am hopeful both systems will be fully engaged by the time our next newsletter goes to print.

The Stanley Cup playoffs are on! I think the longest standing rivalry is between Toronto and Montreal. Montreal fans seem to be more tenacious. They are quick to brag up their team. At this moment they are holding the short end of the stick (pardon the pun) in their match up with Toronto. As of last evening, the match up stands at 3 to 2 for Toronto. Go Leafs go, right Peter!



Do Your Part

Recently, Maggie and I had a relative go into Camp Hill hospital in Halifax which was built in 1917. This is a military hospital for men and women veterans returning home from the war suffering from physical and mental issues. Due to the Covid pandemic, they opened 22 beds for long term care patients. This has been increased to 50 beds. Their license to do this is good until August 2022. The reason I know this is Maggie and I attended a "Designated Caregiver Course" on Tuesday of this week at Camp Hill. It is basically to show you what's expected of you as a caregiver and the proper way to do it. Each patient is allowed up to two caregivers. Some only have one and sadly some have none. When we visit our relative only 1 caregiver is allowed to go to the patient's room at a time. They have tightened the restrictions due to the pandemic. Long term care patients wait at Camp Hill for placement in a home when a bed becomes available. We were told that in all likelihood there would probably be very little, if any, movement until we get out of the pandemic. The course was about an hour long. It detailed how you move in the hospital. For example, you sign the logbook in the lobby upon arrival. They ask you Covid questions and take your temperature. After this, they give you your ID badge and you go directly to the floor of the person you are visiting. After you get off the elevator, you walk to the desk and sign the logbook on that floor and then go directly to the room and nowhere else. If you need anything, you buzz for the nurse who comes to the room. When you are ready to leave, you buzz the nurse, she comes and walks you to the desk where you sign out, get on the elevator, and go back to the lobby. There you sign out in the logbook and return your ID. You do a lot of signing in and out, but everything must be tracked for the safety of the patients.
